HONORS FOR TWO ADULT ARROWMEN

Two of our adult Arrowmen were honored on February 10th 1976, and received the Silver Beaver Award:

RAY L. KITCHENS has given exceptional service to boys. He has spent 30 years in Scouting and has received many of the awards that indicate "Quality Service" to youth. He received his District Award of Merit in 1972, was Outstanding Arrowman in 1973, and received the Distinguished Service Award, El-Ku-Ta # 520 in 1975.

He has served as Cubmaster and as OA Chapter Adviser, and is currently OA Assistant Lodge Adviser. Ray serves his community and Scouting in a unique way—leading a group of Indian dancers. Not only do they entertain, but they teach people an appreciation for Indian culture and folklore

He and his wife have seven children—3 boys. Two are Eagles. He served in the service in World War II.

TONY ZUCCA has been a continuous Scouter since he began as an Assistant Scoutmaster in Long Beach, California, 1954. Since moving to Utah in 1959, he has served as a key unit leader, Scoutmaster, and other positions in building the lives of boys.

He says, "I would rather build guided 'men' than guided missiles." He has been a commissioner, stake Scouting leader, camp program director, and OA chapter adviser. He holds the Arrowhead Honor Award, the Scouter's Award, Scoutmaster's Kay, YMMIA Honor Certificate, and OA Vigil Honor.

OUR COUNTRY'S BICENTENNIAL

In 1832, Samuel Francis Smith, a young divinity student at Andover Theological Seminary in Massachusetts wrote the words for a hymn that he titled "America". Smith borrowed the melody from a German songbook. unaware that it had been used previously for the Prussian national anthem and for the British royal anthem as well. The actual origin of the melody is not known: however, in 1740 a British balladeer had sung it as an "original" song he called "God Save Great George, Our King". Oliver Wendell Holmes, a friend of Smith's praised the lyrics highly, saying: "He wrote My country 'tis of thee. If he had written 'Our' the hymn would not have been as immortal, but that 'My' was a master stroke. Everyone who sings the song at once feels a personal ownership in his native land. The hymn will last as long as the country."

IT'S ABOUT PAT BERRYMAN


