RECRUITER PIN

This pin is the region award for those who recruit a new boy into a troop and help him achieve his Scout rank. The pin is free upon completion.



ELECTION PIN


Try to make your hole in the blanket by doing good work while you are on earth. It is something to be good, but it is far better to do good.

NOAC was a huge success. This year's NOAC was held August 14-18 in Fort Collins, Colorado. There were over 4300 Arrowmen from all over the country; 25 of whom were from our lodge. Our Arrowmen arrived by one of two ways--car or bus. The Arrowmen that arrived by bus were the boys who did not take the tour.

The first day of the conference was Sunday. We had the entire day to walk around and explore Colorado State University. We could also stand in line for most of the morning and wait to buy our goods in the trading post. Later that day, church services for all denominations were held. That night was the opening show. Jeff Mosher was officially recognized as the new National Chief, and Angello Cappelli as the Vice-chief. Also at the opening show, women over the age of 21 were allowed to join as official members, and anyone over the age of 21 that is elected into the Order, now must be approved by the district committee. After the opening show, everyone walked back to or dorms and went to bed.

The second day was an extremely busy day. There were a number of various activities going on. Some of these activities consisted of the National Leadership Seminar, Indian Training, or the National Team Dance Competition. That night was the Rocky Mountain Regional Rendezvous. Each of the six regions in the nation split up and held an awards ceremony, and introduced all of the lodges in that region. After the rendezvous, we ventured back to our dorms and fell asleep.

The third day was also quite busy. There were Ordeal ceremony competitions, training workshops and NLS continued. There was an Indian Show that night. At the show, there was Indian dancing, and a special dance performed by Miss Indian America.



The fourth day was a very exciting day. There were the ceremony finals, a 5K run, National Brotherhood ceremony, and an Indian Pow Wow. At the Pow Wow there was a lip synch contest, Spirit games, and Home Town Flavor Booths which are booths that show what you do in your home town. That night, there was a theme called: THE ONLY ROAD. This was a wonderful, fun and entertaining show about the road that you should take with the OA in life.

The fifth day there was the closing show. At this show, we all saw the week in a slide show, and Jeff Mosher then officially closed the conference. Our lodge then split up into one of the two groups that we came Then we all traveled to Denver. Our lodge reunited at Casa Bonita, a Mexican restaurant with cliff divers and a magician and also good food. After we ate, we again split up into our groups and went to Elitch Gardens, an exciting amusement park in Denver. We stayed at Elitch Gardens for a few hours and then drove to the Comfort Inn in Denver and spent the night.
