NATIONAL CONFERENCE





OUR PAST



The lodge has a lot to look back on from 1990. It grew to a new high of 1475 total members, including 734 new ordeal members, 130 new brotherhood members and 20 new vigil members. It sponsored a week long advanced youth training program (Coup Trail) for O.A. leadership. About 200 of its membership participated in the Scout-O-Rama, 100 attended the Section Conference that we hosted. Flite Freimann served as the Section Secretary, and Ryan Mecham served as the Western Region Chief.

Over 165 members served in lodge or chapter leadership positions. Our chapter assisted with over 500 Eagle courts of honor and about the same Arrow of light ceremonies. The majority of camp staffs and over seventy percent of Silver and Golden Moccasin staffers come from the ranks of our

membership. The Lodge's campsite at the 1990 Jamboral was a center of activity and was the weekend residence of choice. Just ask our supreme chief of the fire. Over 16,000 man-hours of service were rendered by the lodge in 1990. Maybe our motto should be: "Service - Our Finest Achievement!" What better could we be known for?

Camping Winter Camp

Promotion of camping in the council is a prime purpose of the Order of the Arrow. Each issue, a new camping site will be presented which has been recommended by a lodge member. We will need your help on this, so if you know of a good campsite, (with pictures, if possible) send it in to Ihegend c/o the council with your name and home phone number

Winter Camp at Camp Tracy in Mill Creek Canyon should be one of your troop's highlights of the year. Winter Camp runs from the weekend of December 28, 29 through February 22, 23. You can either sleep in cabins or you can bring your own tents. If you want cabin space, you will need reservations soon, since they will fill up quickly. The cost is \$13.00 per person preregistered, or \$15.00 per person at camp. This covers all materials used in camp, a dinner, breakfast, lunch, crackerbarrel, and snacks, a patch, campers insurance, a full staff, and a ribbon for your troop flag.

Tracy Winter Camp features a great tubing hill. Only tubes are allowed on the hill . . . no sleds or toboggans.

There are some things to remember. Your troop needs a Local Tour Permit. Each person must bring a current medical history to check-in. Forms may be obtained at the service center. Every participant should dress for winter weather and have changes. You may wish to mark clothing and equipment to avoid confusion.




Do NOT bring straw for under your tents. This makes an awful mess next spring when the snow melts. If you want a fire, bring your own wood. There isn't any available at camp. Fires must be kept OFF the ground. Cooking barrels are available.

We use No Trace Camping methods at Winter Camp. Whatever you bring in, you take out. Sites will be inspected prior to check-out.

Activities available include tubing, rifle range, snow hockey, tug-o-war, leatherwork, outdoor first aid, No Trace instruction, winter survival, and much, much more.

Applications to register for Winter Camp are available at the Scout Service Center. See you there!


