ORDER OF THE MEMBERSHIP

To become a member of the Order of the Arrow, a Scout or Explorer is chosen by vote of the boys in his unit. This is a unique feature of the Order since the majority of those who select their candidates for this honor are not members of the Lodge. However, Lodge members in the unit have a vote just as do nonmembers. In this way membership is controlled by boys in their own units and not by those who are already Arrow members.

It is important that the members of the unit have the requirements to become a candidate properly explained. Elections should never become a popularity contest. Candidates should be chosen on the basis of being a true Scout or Explorer and a qualified camper.

After election, a Scout, Explorer, or Scouter remains a candidate until he takes the Ordeal of the Order. If this period of candidacy exceeds six months, his name is dropped and he is no longer a candidate. To become a candidate again, he must be re-elected. The executive committee of the Lodge may extend the six-month period between election and induction, if a candidate is ill or there are other unusual circumstances.

Through a united effort of all Arrowmen this year, we have accomplished many things.



PRINCIPLES OF THE ORDER OF THE ARROW

The Order exists primarily as a service organization and especially emphasizes cheerful service in the camping part of the program. It is democratic in character. Boys are elected to membership by the members of their own Scout Troop or Explorer Post. They elect their own officers, plan their own program, and carry out service projects under their own leadership. Adults act as advisors and counselors, but do not run the affairs of the local lodges. Membership is granted to boys and adults on the basis of "not so much for what they have done but for what they are expected to do" in service to their fellow men.

Membership in the Order stems from the home unit and serves to strengthen a member's responsibility to his own unit rather than to draw him away in another program of activities and service projects.

The Order of the Arrow is not a secret society. An air of mystery does surround its ceremonies and meetings, but this is done because of its appeal to boys. Boys who are nonmembers should not be permitted to attend Ordeal, Brotherhood, or Vigil ceremonies. Scoutleaders, clergymen, educators, parents, and others who wish to know the full story of the Order may easily find the answers to their questions by inquiring through their council office.

Spiritual values in the Order of the Arrow seek to glorify the principles of a Scout's duty to his God, country, and fellowman.

Membership in the Order is contingent upon membership in the Boy Scouts of America. Members wishing to be active in the Order must maintain their registrations.



SIZE LIMITS OF GROUPS TRAVELING IN WILDERNESS:

Due to the impact on the environment, limited number of campsites available, and restricted size of campsites in wilderness and back-country areas, it has become necessary to limit the size of each group traveling in wilderness areas to 12 to 14, including guide and leaders. When a unit, planning a trip into a wilderness area, exceeds this number, it will be expected to break up into smaller groups and travel separately under separate leadership. If this procedure is not followed, large groups may be excluded from using many wilderness areas. Most Federal and State agencies have already placed restrictions on size of groups. The co-operation of every unit is expected.
