Camping Scout Falls

Promotion of camping in the council is a prime purpose of the Order of the Arrow. Each issue, a new camping site will be presented which has been recommended by a lodge member. We will need your help on this, so if you know of a good campsite, (with pictures, if possible) send it in to The-Legend c/o the council with your name and home phone number

Scout Falls is located on the Timpooneke Trail on the north side of Mt. Timpanogos. Allow about forty-five minutes to reach the trail head at the parking lot. The best time of year to visit this area is May through October. Take Interstate 15 to the Alpine turnoff. Go east up American Fork Canyon. Stay on the alpine loop to the Timpooneke Guard Station, turn right, and follow the gravel road to the parking lot (about 300 yards). Hike up the trail to the top of the falls (about 1 1/2 miles) or the meadow (about 1/2 mile).


Water from springs is usually available through the end of July. The spring feeding Scout Falls and the stream through the meadow usually dry up in August. Stream water should be treated if you are going to drink it. Giardia is very possible. Some wood is available, but you may need a fire permit. This area is often closed to fires. Backpacking stoves are advised. Toilet facilities are available at the trailhead, but there are none on this part of the trail.

Groups should be kept to ten or less. Break into patrols, if necessary. The best campsites are about half way between the top of the falls and the trail and



at the northwest corner of the meadow. The meadow is sometimes used by families on weekends, but is a much easier hike. Very few people camp at the top of the falls, and the view is spectacular.

It is five miles to Emerald Lake from the Scout Falls campsite, and seven and a half miles to the top of Mt. Timpanogos. Much of this trail is fairly steep. Birds and wildlife are abundant. You may be lucky enough to see mountain goats, mule deer, ruffed grouse, pika, or marmots. The area is excellent for wide games and snowsliding (sometimes even in the middle of summer). In August and September, the slope above the trail southwest of the meadow is covered with wild raspberries and alpine strawberries. Do not leave the trail where the slopes are steep. Stay on deer trails if you go looking for berries.
