FALL CONCLAVE REPORT

On September 25, 1971, the EL-KU-TA Lodge held its annual Fall Conclave under the direction of David Simpson and Frank Matheson, co-chairman, with Norm Simpson as the advisor. Assisting were Rick Thiriot, Bill Hurst, Dave Dickman, and Richard Carpenter. The conclave was held at the Federal Heights Ward recreation hall.

Between 8:00 and 9:00, close to 100 people registered and started the morning off with a fine breakfast of pancakes, bacon, and eggs. The main program began with an Indian Dancing and Costuming Presentation by members of Wasatch Chapter. This set an authentic atmosphere which was to continue on throughout the conclave. We were privileged to have Gordon Smith of Copperhills District speak to us. He talked about the need for the Boy Scouts of America to reestablish a good image in relation to ecology and "leaving a camp site better than when you found it!" (I was quite annoyed myself to see a troop of scouts littering the Uintah Primitive Area while on a back-packing trip. Not only did they have the common garbage of pop cans and candy wrappers, but they were also having fun lighting off strings of firecrackers. -ed.) Mr. Smith brought with him a filmstrip narrated by a recording that showed some of the activities of scouts around the country. Afterwards, Rick Thiriot who had been the MC of the whole shebang, moderated a panel discussion on Ordeals. Many excellent ideas were brought out by panel and the floor, many of which will be incorporated in the 1972 Ordeals.

The high point of the day was when the elections (see center page) were held. Rick Thiriot conducted the elections just before lunch. Lunch consisted of Kentucky Fried Chicken from Harman's. The conclave ended in song. The East High Madrigals, directed by Mrs. Ruth Funk, presented several songs including "He Ain't Heavy" and "One Small Step", a song written for the astronauts. This proved to be the icing on the cake of a very fine conclave.


ATTENTION LODGE MEMBERS

NATIONAL OA CONFERENCE REPORT



August 24, at nine A.M., 18 of our arrowmen gathered at the Salt Lake International Airport. Destination: Champaign, Illinois site of the 56th National Order of the Arrow Conference. Everyone really enjoyed the flight until we changed airlines at Chicago. We were already to leave when the pilot announced that there would be a slight

delay due to problems with the radio. Just then some workmen came and dismantled our left engine. Forty-five minutes later they finished repairing the "radio." We finally checked into our dorms at the University of Illinois.

After dinner that night, many of us started trading patches with other lodges from all over the country. This proved to be one of the most interesting and challenging parts of the conference. As well as meeting a host of new friends we all became professional patch "sharks."

No one seemed to know the difference between night and day. Have you ever tried to stay away during a lecture after patch trading all night long? It was a common sight to see a group of our arrowmen walking aimlessly through the streets of Champaign. This wouldn't have been unusual except that it was three in the morning and they were looking for a pizza joint that was open. The things I remember best from those nights were: patch trading, the numerous poker games, Doc's P.J.'s, Richard's stomach, and John Meng's laughing fits.

Despite all this, we managed to attend all the conference activities. Everyone gained many new ideas from the discussion groups and general sessions. We discussed how to get active members, the inner-city problem, drugs and ecology. We heard speeches from all the "top dogs" in the OA: Dr. E. Urner Goodman, founder of the OA; Carroll A. Edson, cofounder of the OA; David J. Boshea, National Secretary; and Alden G. Barber, Chief

Executive. There were seminars on Indian dancing, singing, ceremonies, and costume.

Thursday marked the start of the DUR-O-THIN (do your own thing). This is the equivalent of our Scout-O-Rama. Many lodges showed their exotic cooking skills. They passed out samples of funnel-cake, Winnebago fry bread, mussels, and roast snake(YUM). EL-KU*TA felt obligated to take the part of the official conference food samplers.



NEW LODGE CHIEF

SETS GOALS FOR '72

During the past two years we have seen an upward trend in the effectiveness of the lodge. We have witnessed an increase in membership and activities in the lodge and chapters. Last year committees were set up and there was considerable progress made in them. The foundation has been laid for a great year in 1972.

One of the large problems EL-KU-TA Lodge has faced is the disunification of the lodge officers, chapters and the membership as a whole. Unfortunately, instead of trying to solve our differences as brothers and arrowmen we resort, in many cases, to undermining one another. Too much pettiness has been a part of the EL-KU-TA Lodge. I know that this can be changed. The lodge officers and advisors for 1972 are completely united in purpose. I believe that if I, as Lodge Chief, can make certain that before making policy or taking action on anything, that all facets of the question are brought to light, and that we officers set the example of being objective, I am positive that we can stamp out all of the arguing, undermining, pettiness, and hard-feelings in the lodge.

I have several changes that will be made during 1972. The key word in my administration will be <u>organization</u>. I will give you a brief sketch of some of these changes and a "planbook" vill be printed in December that will show in detail that organization, programs of each committee for the year, dates, and many other things to help you, as rembers, know exactly what is happening throughout next year.

Quite a lot of consolidation will be done throughout the lodge.

The first step will come with the council going to five divisions, instead of 15 districts. EL-KU-TA will follow this new policy and convert to 5 chapters. Instead of about ten committees, we will have only 5 Lodge committees. They will be public relations, Camping Promotion, Service (will include activities), Inductions (will include ordeals, brotherhood, unit elections, and ceremonies), and the Membership-Finance committee. Presiding over the Camping Promotion, Service, and Inductions committees will be Deputy Vice-Chiefs appointed by me. The Secretary, David Simpson, and Treasurer, Richard Carpenter, will be cochairmen of the Membership-Finance Committee. I will also appoint the Chairman of the Public Relations Committee (which includes the Elk's Echo). Each of these five committees will have one advisor assigned specifically and only to that committee. The chapters will have three committees; Inductions, Camping Promotion, and Service, plus one representative to the Lodge Public Relations Committee and the Membership-Finance Committee.

Each of these committees will pre-plan their tentative program for the entire year by December and it will be printed in the planbook.

This way at the beginning of the new year we will know what we need to do so we may properly plan, follow-through, and publicize all activities and projects.

These are some of the major changes to be aware of. I am sure that with your activity and cooperation, we can have a fantastic year. It will be one where everyone is united to strengthen the entire council and prove to the council that we can be of use, that we can accomplish much, and that we are worthy of being members of the Order of the Arrow.


