ORDER OF THE ARROW HONORS A MAN TO THE ARROW HONORS OUR COUNTRY'S BICENTENNIAL

As a political thinker, diplomat, statesman, and President, Jefferson did much to mold the American spirit. As an author and educator, he influenced the American mind of his day.

Even after his retirement in 1809, following sixty years of public service, Jefferson was consulted constantly on public affairs. At Monticello, he carried on an immense correspondence with people all over the world and remained still faithful to his vow of "eternal hostility against every form of tyranny over the mind of man".

Thomas Jefferson died July 4, 1826, fifty years to the day after the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, of which he was the proud author.


