



ing and beneficial to the boy. Following are some cautions which we hope every Scoutmaster will follow to avoid the disappointments that can sometimes occur. FIRSTUNDERSTAND THE REQUIREMENTS. "While a Life Scout, Plan, Develop, and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to your religious institution, school, or community. The project idea must be approved by your Scoutmaster, Troop Committee and reviewed by the Council or District before you start." (Pg. 57, Boy Scout Handbook)
Although the general idea of the project need not be original, the details should be planned by the Scout himself, sometimes with the aid of the person whom he is responsible to, such as a forest ranger when doing a park project.
 He must recruit other Scouts to assist him in carrying out the project. (Minimum of 2.) He must develop all the details of the project in obtaining necessary permits, materials, etc. He must utilize others to carry out the project and demonstrate the level of leadership expected from an Eagle Scout in directing them. The length and difficulty of the project differs from Scout to Scout, but should approach the limits of the Scout's capabilities in scope and magnitude. The candidate should plan to contribute at least 12 hours of his time to carrying out and planning the project.
SECONDGET APPROVAL IN ADVANCE. An Eagle project must be of lasting value and benefit the School, Church or Community in order to qualify. Many projects may appear to meet this criteria, but upon close examination are found to be only a commendable "Good Turn" by the Scout and his friends. For example: cleaning the snow from the sidewalks of all the widows in a neighborhood all winter might seem to fit the church benefit category, but in reality, is simply a 'good turn' to several widows. * * * * * * * * * * * * *
