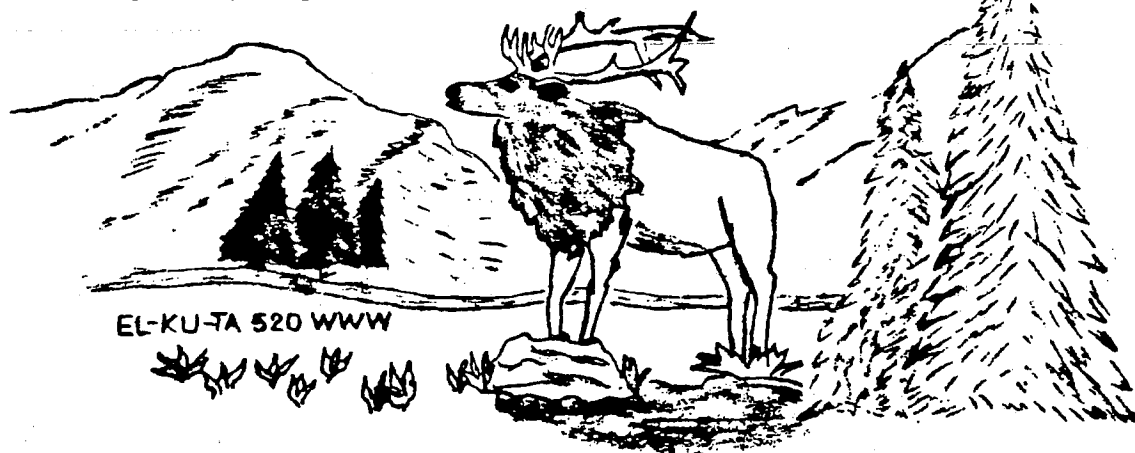


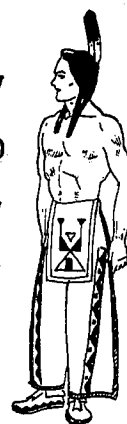

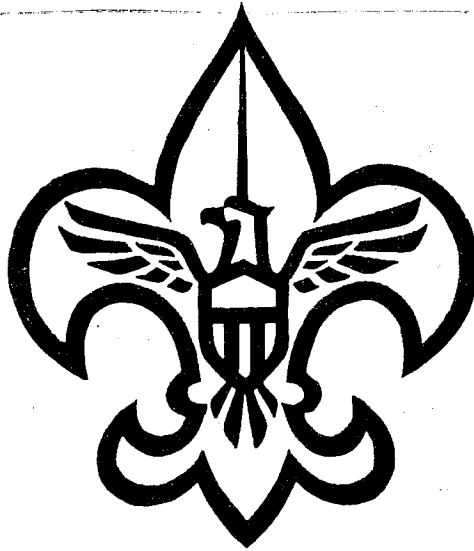

A POCKET BANQUET!

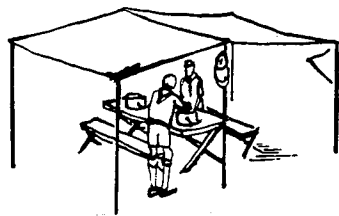


ALUMINIM FOIL DINNER

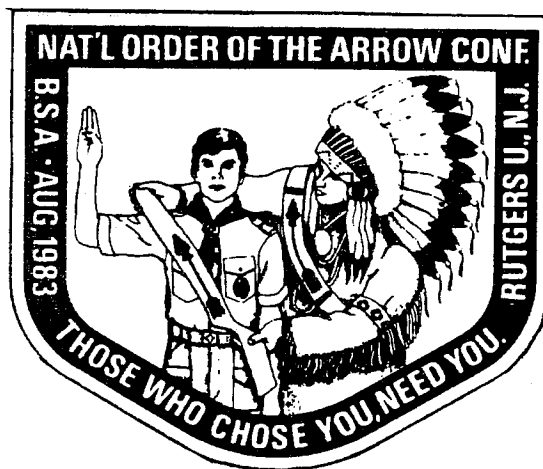
Tear off about a 14" piece of aluminum foil. Scrape 1 or 2 carrots. Slice them in about $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick rounds. Place on the foil in a 5 to 6 inch circle. Add a second layer (2 layers of carrots). Then peel one potatoe. Slice it about $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick or less. Place 2 or 3 layers on top of carrots. Peel outer skin of 1 onion. Slice it (about $\frac{1}{4}$ " thick or less). Place one layer on top of potatoes. Then place about a $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. hamburger patten on top of the onion. Place another layer of onion, a layer or two of potatoes and two more layers of carrots. Then wet hand and sprinkle water from hand onto pile of food. Do this twice.

Pick up the two, long outside edges of tinfoil. Bring them together and fold down $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Fold again. Keep on folding until you reach the food pile. Now fold in each side a little at a time until you reach the food bundle. With top and both sides sealed, tear off another piece of tinfoil and repeat folding to give a double wrapped protection. Next throw into fire and cook about 25 mins. Open and enjoy! (You may want some salt and pepper or butter to go with it).

(Sometimes the outside layer of carrots may burn, so take out and enjoy the rest of the dinner.)



CONFERENCE



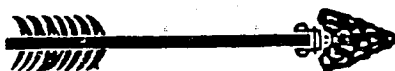

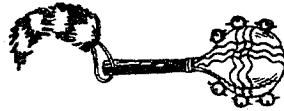
Chapter Ch-Ch Chatter

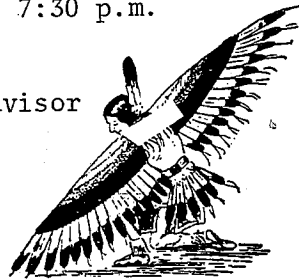

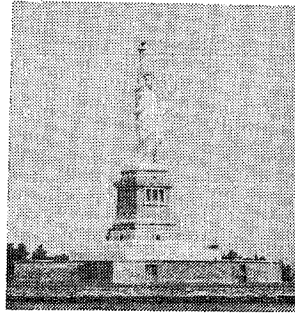

After the Conference was over at Rutgers, we slipped into New York City to ride the subway and see the Statue of Liberty.

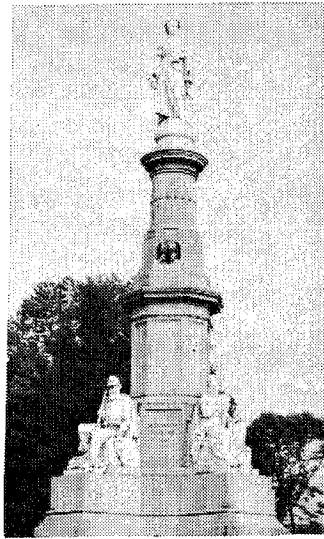
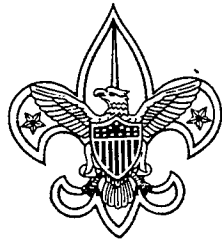

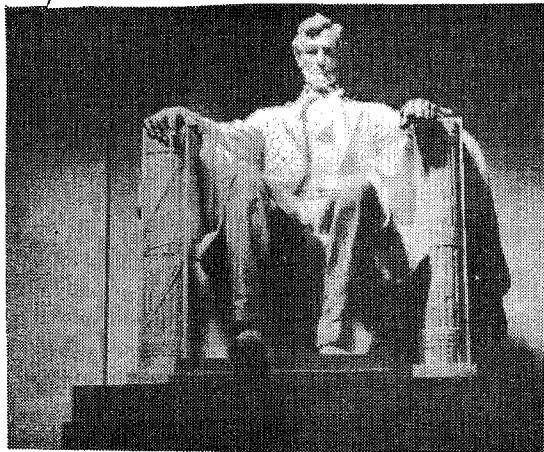
We then picked up our vans and proceeded to Treasure Island, the birthplace of the Order of the Arrow. There, we had supper and participated in an original ordeal ceremony.

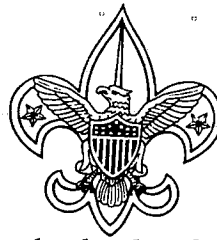
While in Washington D.C., we visited the L.D.S. Temple and went to see Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington.
